Philip sat at the drawing table and began to draw a butterfly that he had seen in the garden, after morning tea.




"I'm drawing a butterfly. The wings are wavy to make the butterfly fly".

Children Interact Verbally With Others For A Range Of Purposes

Engage in enjoyable interactions using verbal language.

Convey and construct messages with purpose and confidence.

Respond verbally to what they see, hear touch, feel and taste.

Use language and representations from play, music and art to share and project meaning.

Contribute their ideas and experiences in play, small and large group discussions.

Attend and give cultural cues that they are listening to and understanding what is said to them.

Interact with others to explore ideas and concepts and clarify challenge thinking.
